On Friday night we had an intimate and engaging conversation on the life of mussels and the restoration of the former "dead zone" of the Mississippi River in the Twin Cities. Mike Davis of the MN DNR led the discussion and showed some interesting images of floating sewage mats from the 1930s and how the Pig's Eye Sewage Treatment Center has changed over the years.

On Saturday morning, an eager and enthusiastic group of 20 plus people showed up at the Hwy 40 monitoring site on the Chippewa River to look for mussels. Bernard Sietman and Mike explained how they monitor mussels and helped with identification. Both of them were impressed by the number of live mussels and different species found in a short stretch of the river. In one small spot, 10 live mussels were collected.
