Forum on Agricultural Practices on Shoreland Areas

The Minnesota Department of Natural Resources (DNR) will host a public forum on agricultural practices in shoreland areas on February (Monday) from 12 noon to 5 p.m. in the Redwood Area Community Center in Redwood Falls. Intended for farmers and producers, as well as agency officials and local government staff, the forum will provide an overview of current requirements for agricultural practices in shoreland areas and a discussion of how the rules might be improved. In addition to the DNR, representatives from the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency, Minnesota Department of Agriculture, Board of Water and Soil Resources, and local representatives will be available to give presentations and answer questions.

Big Stone II and the U.S. EPA

The proposed coal-fired plant Big Stone II was back in the news as the U.S. EPA objects to an air quality permit issued by South Dakota. According to the EPA, Big Stone II officials have 90 days to change their permit to satisfy regulations for air quality. In a letter to South Dakota authorities, EPA flagged a number of deficiencies in the air pollution permit – from inadequate analysis of some potential emissions to failure to establish adequate emission monitoring schedules.

- <u>Big Stone II a 3-year process</u> (Fergus Falls Daily Journal). The Minnesota Public Utilities Commission (PUC) decision to grant transmission lines sought by Big Stone II utilities, including Fergus Falls-based Otter Tail Power Company, is based on what the PUC terms "an extraordinarily extensive case record that began with the filing of the petition in April, 2005."
- <u>EPA files objections to coalfired power plant</u> (West Central Tribune). South Dakota Public Utilities Commission Chairman Dusty Johnson says the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency has filed objections to a state air quality permit granted for the proposed coal-fired Big Stone II power plant.
- <u>EPA overturns Big Stone II, environmental groups report</u> (MinnPost). Just a week after Minnesota's PUC approved a major power transmission line in southwestern Minnesota as part of the Big Stone II coal-burning power plant proposal in South Dakota, the federal EPA has overturned South Dakota's approval of the project, reports the Sierra Club and Clean Water Action, two groups that oppose the project.
- <u>Jill Burcum: EPA flexes its muscles</u> (Minneapolis Star Tribune). New EPA objections to the Big Stone II coal plant certainly suggest more scrutiny ahead for coal-fired utility projects under an Obama administration.

In the first major coal plant decision since President Obama took Office, the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) has denied a permit for construction of the Big Stone II coal-fired power plant in South Dakota! The decision came down just a week after the Minnesota Public Utilities Commission (PUC) approved a permit (with several conditions) for transmission lines for the plant, which many saw as the final hurdle in the path of the plant's construction.

Observers believe that this ruling from the Obama Administration, made on the last possible day of review by the EPA, sends a strong message about the incoming administration's policies toward the future of coal energy. We believe this ruling will make it extremely difficult for Big Stone II to go forward, according to CURE Renewable Energy Consultant Duane Ninneman. With a new commitment to science and accountability at the Federal level, combined with the conditions placed on the plant by the Minnesota PUC, investors may finally give up on the Big Stone II plan.

This EPA decision makes it all the more important that we as a region work together to advance new approaches to securing our energy future. We invite everyone to sit down to discuss what our options are this coming **Thursday**, **January 29**th

Water Quality Articles

<u>Bill Boyne: Country needs new national farm policy</u> (Rochester Post Bulletin). It is clear that wholesale revisions of the nation's farm policies and farm subsidy program are needed. If this can be done, there will be a long-term improvement in the nation's health, in soil quality, in the lives of small farmers and in the nation's economy.

<u>Central Minnesota DNR officials in the mainstream of biomass energy</u> (Minn Post). From turkey litter to wood waste, there's a lot of action in the biomass energy sector happening in central Minnesota.

<u>Minnesota River: water that keeps us alive</u> (Jordan Independent). Water keeps us alive. Literally. Our body is 70 percent water and the brain – an incredible 90 percent. While humans could live around a month without food, without water we may only last five to seven days.

<u>Obama's action gives clean car backers a boost</u> (Minnesota Public Radio). Minnesota environmentalists are cheering President Obama's decision to reconsider California's request to set strict standards to control greenhouse gas emissions from cars and light trucks.
