The Next Generation to Highlight CURE 21st Annual Meeting

Saturday February 9th, 2013

Granite Falls, MN - Prairie's Edge Convention Center

The 21st annual meeting of Clean Up the River Environment (CURE) will be held on Saturday, February 9th from 4 - 10 p.m. in the new location of the Prairie's Edge Convention Center & Casino just south of Granite Falls off of Hwy 23. After 21 years, the organization has grown to the point of needing a larger venue to meet and celebrate the growing community of Minnesota River enthusiasts. Pre-registration is required by calling <u>1-877-269-2873</u> or by e-mailing <u>dixie@cureriver.org</u>.

This event will focus on *"The Next Generation"* and will feature brief presentations by "Kayak Kate" Eggers and current CURE board president Joshua Preston. They will share how their involvement with CURE has made a difference for them personally. Kate is a senior at Gustavus Adolphus and Josh is a senior at the University of Minnesota Morris.

Highlighting the evening will be skit about CURE, the Next Generation and personal stories about the Minnesota River. The skit is being created by Ashley Hanson and Andrew Gaylord of the Meandering River Walk Theater Production. Hanson and Gaylord will be hosting a Minnesota River **Story Swap Workshop starting at 3:30 p.m, at Prairies Edge**. The public is invited to come to the meeting early to share stories that will be gathered and incorporated into the special performance that evening.

At 4:00 p.m. the public is invited to participate in the **CURE World Café**. Topics for discussion include Upstream/Downstream Dialogues; Scenic Rock Outcrop Protection; Dam Removal/ New Rapids; Renewable Energy Policy Initiatives. Anyone interested in getting in-depth updates about CURE's work in these areas is invited to attend.

The Annual meeting will formally will begin at 5:00 pm with a **Social Hour** featuring the music of the Stermer Brothers of Montevideo followed by a banquet meal at 6:00 p.m., program and board elections at 7:00 p.m. and an awards ceremony at 8:00 p.m. The evening will conclude with a kayak sweepstakes giveaway at 9:00 p.m.

A sell out crowd is expected, so CURE office manager Dixie Tilden is encouraging everyone to register by February 4 deadline. Cost of the meeting is \$30 for adults, \$15 for students & children if registration is made by Feb. 4. After February 4, the cost for adults is \$35.

Clean Up the River Environment (CURE) is a grassroots non-profit organization governed by a democratically elected 15-member board of directors. It is the one of the largest and oldest citizen organizations working in the Minnesota River Watershed. This past year CURE has worked with others to bring national attention to the Minnesota River Watershed through a National Blueways Nomination process. CURE has convened dozens of dialogues and events involving more than 1,000 citizens who are now involved with projects designed to improve water quality and develop the potential of the river to attract youth and new investment to the region.

Talking "Soil Health" Monday February 11th, 2013 Fairmont, MN

Join Rural Advantage and University of Minnesota Extension for the first of four Third Crop Producer Meetings this winter. The topic of soil health will kick-off the 2013 season. The "Soil Health" Third Crop Producer Meeting will be held at the Knights of Columbus in Fairmont, Minnesota, from 10am to 3pm on Monday, February 11, 2013.

The first speaker of the "Soil Health" Third Crop Producer Meeting will be Joe Kristoff, the Area 5 Resource Soil Scientist with the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS). Kristoff will explain what a soil needs to be considered healthy and what we can do to get it there. Carissa Spencer, the Minnesota State Agronomist with NRCS, will follow with her presentation on the different programs and events that the Minnesota NRCS will be focusing on in 2013 in order to increase soil health around the state. The third speaker will be Kristine Moncada, a researcher at the University of Minnesota. Moncada and partners have been conducting research along Elm Creek in south central Minnesota. She will be discussing the importance of nurse/cover crops and good soil health to the quick establishment of prairie plants.

After lunch, the Third Crop Producer Meeting will resume with a discussion of the benefits of including alfalfa in a corn-based cropping system. Matt Yost with the University of Minnesota will be talking on this subject and sharing his research from his on-farm plots which focused on the alfalfa nitrogen credit. One of these on-farm research plots was on the Jerry Ackermann farm in Jackson County, Minnesota. Ackermann will be sharing information about his farming operation which includes raising alfalfa, corn, and soybeans, utilizing strip-tillage, and using cover crops. The last speaker of the day will

be Jill Sackett with University of Minnesota Extension. Sackett will be giving a summary of Rural Advantage's piece of a recently completed cover crop demonstration project as well as sharing farmer experiences from around Minnesota.

The Knights of Columbus is located at 920 East 10th Street in Fairmont, Minnesota. Registration and refreshments will begin at 9:30am. The morning session will run from 10:00am to 12:00pm and the afternoon session will run from 1:00pm to 3:00pm. There will be an hour break for lunch on your own. The workshop is FREE of charge and pre-registration is not necessary.

Minnesota Pollution Control Agency February 5th, 2013 Comments are invited on environmental review for landfill expansion in Blue Earth County

The Minnesota Pollution Control Agency is inviting comments on an Environmental Assessment Worksheet prepared for the proposed expansion of the Ponderosa Sanitary Landfill in Blue Earth County. The M-P-C-A also invites comments on the permit for the landfill, which is up for renewal. Comments, which must be in writing, are due by 4:30 P-M on March 6.

Blue Earth County is proposing to expand the landfill, located six miles southwest of Mankato, by sixteen acres, with twelve-point-four acres for disposal space and the rest for haul roads and stormwater controls. The expanded disposal area will be lined and include a system to collect and treat any rainwater or snow melt that contacts the buried waste. These measures will help prevent contamination of groundwater and the nearby Blue Earth River. As with the current landfill area, the facility will use a system of wells to detect any contaminants in groundwater.

The landfill accepts about 46-thousand tons of waste a year.

MPCA completes 64 enforcement cases in fourth quarter of 2012

The Minnesota Pollution Control Agency completed 64 enforcement cases in 39 Minnesota counties during the fourth quarter of 2012. These penalties totaled just over 730-thousand dollars.

For all of 2012, the M-P-C-A completed 214 cases totaling just over two-point-seven-million dollars. Nearly 10 percent of that money was spent toward the completion of supplemental environmental projects.
