## Ravine Workshop to be Held in North Mankato April 8

# Farmers in southeastern Minnesota invited to unique opportunity involving Minnesota's lakes, rivers and streams

The MDA and the Whitewater River Project invite farmers in the Whitewater Rive area to two open houses on April 4th and 7th to learn how they can get involved in the Minnesota Agricultural Water Quality Certification Program (MAWQCP). MAWQCP is a voluntary program designed to accelerate adoption of on-farm conservation practices that protect Minnesota's rivers and streams. Producers who implement and maintain approved farm management practices will be certified and in turn assured that their operation will obtain regulatory certainty for a period of ten years. the Whitewater River area was selected as one of four pilots throughout the state to test and refine the program. This pilot area includes parts of Olmsted, Wabasha, and Winona counties. At the open houses, MDA and Whitewater River Project staff will provide a brief presentation on the program and demonstrate the assessment tool used to evaluate individual operations. A panel discussion will feature local farmers, advisory committee members, and technical staff. Attendees will also have the opportunity to ask questions about the program and receive a free assessment of their farm. The open house will be held:
