Big Stone County Citizens Continue Campaign for Outcrops at April 17 Hearing in Ortonville

Citizens challenging a conditional use permit request by Strata Corporation to create a new granite crushing and blasting guarry next to homes, a bike trail and the Minnesota River are hoping to be joined by River Valley tourism advocates at a Big Stone County Board hearing on Tuesday, April 17, 7:00 p.m. at the Ortonville Armory, 309 Madison Avenue, Ortonville, MN.

Growing public outcry against the plan has prompted the commissioners to move the hearing to the Armory, one of the largest public spaces in the county at the headwaters of the Minnesota River. Organizers are urging supporters of the emerging nature and culture tourism industry from throughout the Minnesota River Valley to turn out and express their opposition to the mining permit.

"The way things are shaping up, it appears that a YES vote for Strata's permit is a NO vote for the people of Big Stone County and the anticipated National Blueway designation designed to bring tourist dollars and new residents to the region," Clinton resident and Land Stewardship Project organizer Rebecca Terk said. "The growing coalition of local residents opposed to this permit intend to present new information at this hearing about the ways in which approval of Strata's permit application will be detrimental to habitat, property values, human health and the region's growing tourism industry."

Residents of Ortonville Township, site of the proposed 300 foot deep mining pits, and their allies in Big Stone County and beyond are being allowed to present 5 minute long testimony at the public hearing which will become part of the public record if future lawsuits are filed. For the past several weeks, the

township board has been meeting with individual County Commissioners to discuss numerous concerns with the proposed permit.

In February, the Ortonville Township Board of Supervisors passed a moratorium on large industrial development to gain time to draft zoning rules that will address residents' concerns. "The Township moratorium is enough to put the proposed quarry on hold, but we are asking the County Commissioners to vote it down at the county level as well to send a message to Strata that their plan poses too much risk for current residents," stated Nancy Aune, one of the local organizers.

MPCA extends comment periods for water-quality reports on Mississippi, Minnesota rivers

St. Paul, Minn. — The Minnesota Pollution Control Agency (MPCA) is extending the public comment periods for reports about water quality in the Mississippi and Minnesota rivers.

Due to a high level of interest, the public comment period has been extended to May 29, 2012, for the Total Maximum Daily Load (TMDL) draft reports about Minnesota River turbidity and South Metro Mississippi River total suspended solids. The comment period for the reports began Feb. 27 with a notice in the "State Register."

The TMDL reports focus on turbid water caused primarily by sediment. Turbidity is caused by suspended and dissolved matter, such as clay, silt, organic matter, and algae. High turbidity results in poor water quality for aquatic habitat, recreation, industrial use, and human consumption.

The two documents are available for public review and comment on the MPCA's <u>TMDL Projects and Staff</u> <u>Contacts webpage</u>.

MPCA awards \$5.2 million for water-quality projects

Reducing phosphorus in lakes, protecting water resources, and addressing failing septic systems are among the projects funded by \$5.2 million in financial aid recently approved by the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency (MPCA). As funded by the Clean Water Partnership (CWP) program, 10 agency partners across Minnesota will receive grants and/or loans to investigate pollutants in lakes and rivers and take action to protect waters from those pollutants.

The following projects will begin this spring and continue for three years:

 "Neighborhood Lakes Management Plans," city of Eagan, \$167,000 grant, Minnesota River Basin;

- "Chippewa River Accelerated Restoration," Chippewa County, \$900,000 loan, Minnesota River Basin;
- "Heron Lake TMDL Phosphorus Reduction Project," Heron Lake Watershed District, \$450,000 loan, Des Moines River Basin;
- "Kanabec Water Resources Protection Project," Kanabec Soil and Water Conservation District, \$201,892 grant, St. Croix River Basin;
- "Lake McCarrons Subwatershed Best Management Practices (BMPs) Project," Capitol Region Watershed District, \$275,000 grant, Upper Mississippi River Basin;
- "Lower Sauk-Metro Area Water Quality Protection," Sauk River Watershed District, \$298,000 grant and \$150,000 loan, Upper Mississippi River Basin;
- "Protecting North and South Fork Yellow Bank River," Lac Qui Parle-Yellow Bank Watershed District, \$260,900 grant and \$370,000 loan, Minnesota River Basin;
- "Snake River Watershed Resource Protection Project," Snake River Watershed Management Board, \$400,000 loan, St. Croix River Basin;
- "Steele County Septic System Loan Program," Steele County, \$700,000 loan, Lower Mississippi/ Cedar River Basin; and
- "Targeting BMPs in the Crow River Watershed," Crow River Organization of Water, \$1.1 million loan, Upper Mississippi River Basin.

Created by the Minnesota Legislature in 1987, the Clean Water Partnership program provides financial and technical assistance to diagnose and address threats to water resources. The next funding round will begin this fall.

MPCA completes investigation into distribution of hazardous mercury skin creams

St. Paul, Minn. — Cosmetics containing hazardous levels of mercury that were marketed as skinlightening preparations to ethnic communities are no longer available at Twin Cities retailers thanks to an investigation by several state and county agencies.

The Minnesota Department of Public Health (MDH) and the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency (MPCA) worked jointly with staff from Hennepin and Ramsey counties, the federal Food and Drug Administration (FDA), the Minnesota Poison Control System, and representatives from Twin Cities ethnic communities to identify products containing mercury and outlets that sold them, remove the products from distribution channels, and educate consumers about why they're unsafe and how to properly dispose of them.

"This was a serious public health and pollution issue which the MPCA and our partner agencies moved to address quickly," MPCA Commissioner Paul Aasen said. "Mercury is toxic. Even in small amounts it's a danger to human health and the environment. The concentration of mercury in some of these products is 165,000 times the federal threshold for hazardous waste."

The drive to identify and remove the hazardous products started in last May, when Ramsey County public health staff, in their preventive health work with ethnic communities, learned that skin creams containing mercury were being sold at retail stores and kiosks in the Twin Cities and obtained samples of some of the products. Because state law prohibits selling cosmetics or toiletries containing more than one part per million (ppm) mercury, the county brought in the MDH and the MPCA.

Through the spring and early summer of 2011, the MPCA and Hennepin County investigated potential distributors of the hazardous products. Stores were inspected and products were screened using a handheld device that detects mercury vapor. Products found to contain mercury above one ppm were seized. The MDH public health laboratory provided comprehensive chemical analysis of the seized products. Nearly 22 boxes of goods were seized and sampled, and the products found to be banned under state law were destroyed. The FDA also has been able to use the MDH's analytical data to stop importation of several previously unknown mercury-containing cosmetic products.

In May 2011, the MPCA sent out about 1,350 cease-and-desist letters, and received 105 letters or emails in response. Included in these letters was a list of products know to contain mercury, compiled by Ramsey County Public Health and the MPCA.

The MPCA issued an Administrative Order to Panorama Fashion & Beauty in Minneapolis in May 2011, and a Notice of Violation to CoCo Beauty Supply in Brooklyn Park in January 2012. Those actions now have been formally closed, and MPCA staff have confirmed that all mercury-containing products have been removed from the shelves of those sellers.

"Our investigation removed some major sources of these illegal products," Aasen said. "It's possible that someone may still try to sell them, but they need to know that it's illegal to sell these products and that penalties for the continued sale or distribution will be assessed. We urge all consumers not to buy or use these hazardous products, and to let the MPCA or county health departments know if they see them for sale."

Along with the health risks of using mercury-containing skin-care products, the task force's other main concern was that once word got out, consumers who had products at home would simply dispose of them in household trash, increasing the amount of mercury released to the environment. Messages to the public emphasized that consumers should not just avoid buying and using these products, but also ensure that products already purchased are disposed of properly at a household hazardous waste facility.

Cover Crop Field Day – Goodhue County

Cover crops offer multiple benefits to farmers. They can reduce soil erosion, increase water infiltration, increase soil health, act as an emergency forage, and much more. Cover crops are most easily established after canning crops, small grains, or silage, but can also fit into the corn-soybean rotation.

Red Wing area farmer Kevin Ballman partnered with Rural Advantage and University of Minnesota Extension in fall 2011 on a cover crop project looking at different broadcast planting rates of winter rye after soybeans. A later-than-expected establishment date and dry fall conditions appeared to be a recipe for disaster. Instead, warmer than usual March temperatures have provided a recipe for success.

For Minneapolis and Hennepin County residents interested in improving access to locally grown fresh foods, growing the local economy, creating more urban friendly farming policies, and enhancing environmental sustainability, the Minneapolis League of Women Voters hosted an informational forum on Thursday March 22.

<u>Toxic Waters</u> (Minnesota 2020). Last week, a report by <u>Environment Minnesota</u> (and co-authored by the Frontier Group) was released summarizing some findings from the EPA's Toxic Release Inventory (TRI). The report (available <u>online</u>), titled *Wasting our Waterways 2012: Toxic Industrial Pollution and the Unfulfilled Promise of the Clean Water Act*, gives an overview of the 226 million pounds of toxic chemicals that were dumped into over 1,400 different waterways throughout the US in 2010.

From farm to distributor to table: The forgotten middleman in Twin Cities' local food market (TC Daily Planet). You may have tried Brian and Leslie Axdahl's Stillwater-grown vegetables. If you bought sweet corn or green beans at Byerly's or tried Crave restaurant's creamed corn or ordered the sesame quinoa and green bean salad at Birchwood Café, there's a good chance the Axdahls had a hand in growing your dinner.

<u>At U of M-Morris, alternative energy on par with low-priced fossil fuels</u> (Minnesota Public Radio). Officials at the University of Minnesota Morris were thrilled to find out this week that even with natural gas prices at 10-year lows, heating the campus with biomass was a competitive alternative to burning fossil fuels.

<u>Zebra mussels vanish from stretch of St. Croix River</u> (Minneapolis Star Tribune). A St. Croix River menace that's waged war on the healthiest native mussel population in Minnesota has retreated, bringing hope of a turning point in what had seemed a relentless invasion.

<u>House passes \$105 million Legacy funding bill</u> (St. Paul Pioneer Press). The Minnesota House on Wednesday, April 4, passed a \$105 million bill that pays for an array of outdoors preservation and restoration projects with Legacy Amendment dollars.

<u>Anderson: In House, clueless lead clueless on outdoors issues</u> (Minneapolis Star Tribune). Lawmakers follow a wearily familiar script of professing to stand up for our resources while trying to ruin them.

<u>MPCA: Skin products with mercury removed from store shelves</u> (Minnesota Public Radio). Ramsey County health workers were the first to hear about skin lightening products being sold in Minnesota after speaking with members of the Twin Cities Somali community.

<u>Editorial: Pink slime controversy will hurt farmers</u> (Albert Lea Tribune). Consumers are always right, even when scientific evidence says they are wrong.

<u>Editorial: Food isn't any safer without 'pink slime'</u> (Minneapolis Star Tribune). Debate was rushed, reflecting a lack of trust in beef industry.

Letter: Home sweet home - planet Earth (TC Daily Planet). The first Earth Day on April 22, 1970 was initiated by Senator Gaylord Nelson of Wisconsin. A catalyst was the publication in 1962 of Silent Spring, the best-seller by Rachel Carson, alerting many people for the first time to critical environmental problems.

<u>Move up fishing opener? Not all resorters are game</u> (Minneapolis Star Tribune). Moving Minnesota's fishing opener up a week might sound like a great idea for walleye-hungry anglers, but not everyone is thrilled.
