“This Perennial Land” author presents at the Greater Blue Earth River Basin Alliance July meeting.

At the July 8th 2011 Greater Blue Earth River Basin Alliance (GBERBA) Policy meeting, attendees were treated to a presentation from Lansing Shepard, co-author of the book “This Perennial Land”; a book about the Greater Blue Earth River Watershed, restorative agriculture and the landscape.

Co-authors Lansing Shepard and Paula Westmoreland describe the book in this way, “This book is the product of a journey we began back in 2003. It is the story of a beautiful and intensely farmed land that has been written off as a “sacrificial landscape”- a natural place ceded entirely to industrial use-even by many concerned about the environment. We felt strongly then and even stronger now, that every landscape should be healthy and imbued with the processes that sustain it.

This is also a story of people trying to make a living farming with nature in mind, but within a farm subsidy system that largely discourages such practice. The challenges faced by anyone doing that are considerable, as was sorting out the complex and multi-layered issues.”

The book also includes an “opportunity map” offering “ a rough blueprint—a conceptual starting point—for landowners, policymakers, and citizen who want a part in forging a new vision for returning health, beauty, and economic stability to corn and soybean country.”

Cover Crop Cost-share Dollars Available

Rural Advantage, in partnership with Practical Farmers of Iowa, is seeking agricultural producers interested in utilizing cover crops. Cost-share dollars are available. This project is funded by NCR-SARE.

Cover crops are capable of providing multiple benefits when placed on the landscape. These benefits include: decreased soil erosion, increased soil organic matter, and increased soil nutrients. Common cover crops for Minnesota include: winter rye, oats, barley, field pea, and red clover. Cover Crops can easily be used after canning crop harvest, silage harvest, or small grain harvest. It is also possible to use cover crops in a corn/soybean rotation. Cover Crops are ideal for prevented plant acres as well.

Rural Advantage is seeking farmers willing to establish cover crops. Funding is available for up to \$20 per acre for up to 20 acres [\$400 maximum per farm]. Participating farmers may plant the cover crop(s) of their desire. A demonstration aspect and simple reporting will be required. Funding for the project runs from Fall 2009 to Fall 2012. Farmers from all areas of Minnesota are welcome to participate.
