MDA to offer free waste pesticide collections in east central and metro counties

The MDA will host a series of waste pesticide collections in seven east central and metro Minnesota counties from Tuesday, August 19, through Wednesday, September 10, 2014. Through these free collection events, Minnesota homeowners and farmers can safely dispose of unwanted and unusable pesticides. MDA has collected over 5.25 million pounds around the state since the program started in 1990. The program accepts unwanted, unusable agricultural and consumer type pesticides including insecticides, fungicides, herbicides and rodenticides. However, crop oils, adjuvants, pesticide rinsate, fertilizer, treated seed, contaminated soil and empty pesticide containers will not be accepted. The collections are open to farmers, homeowners, commercial pesticide applicators, golf courses, lawn care companies, structural pest control operators and other pesticide users. No pre-registration is required. Collection sites will accept up to 300 pounds of eligible product at no cost. MDA requests that citizens call (651) 201-6562 to provide advance notification if they wish to drop off more than 300 pounds of product. $\label{eq:mpca} \textbf{MPCA board adopts changes to water quality standards}$

The MPCA recently adopted amendments to water quality standards addressing eutrophication of rivers, streams, Mississippi River navigation pools and Lake Pepin. The amendments also replace the turbidity standard with a TSS standard. A draft of the amendments was released in June 2013, followed by a public comment period from November 2013 to January 2014, including a public hearing held Jan. 8, 2014.

Seventeen parties commented on the amendments. See their comments, the MPCA and more details in the board packet online. The MPCA Citizen Board adopted the standards at its June 24, 2014 meeting. Following that meeting, the Minnesota Environmental Science and Economic Review Board petitioned the MPCA Citizens Board for a stay and reconsideration of the standards. At its July 22 meeting, the board heard from several parties about the petition before voting to deny the stay. A webcast of the meeting, along with the board packet is available on the agency website.

Food companies can apply for funding to help promote products

The MDA announced the release of new funding for its Tradeshow Support Program (TSP). This helps small Minnes ota food and value-added agricultural companies exhibit their products in tradeshows, like the Midwest Pantry's "Local Food and Gift Show," held August 10 in Northeast Minneapolis, where 2014's funding was first announced. The TSP helps Minnesota food companies do more in-store product demonstrations and attend more sales events to help with market access. The Midwest Pantry Local Food and Gift Show highlighted how funds help cutting-edge local food merchandisers and entrepreneurs secure deals with wholesale buyers. Small food companies face the same startup perils as any entrepreneur, but the wave of interest in artisan, local and healthy foods creates market opportunity. MDA Business Development Specialist, Brian Erickson, said, "Events like those provided by Midwest Pantry and the funding assistance to exhibit from the TSP help local food entrepreneurs capitalize on consumer trends by clearing marketing hurdles early in the development." Nearly 50 small Minnesota food companies participated in the first full year of the TSP. Those companies projected sales above \$800,000 and accessed an estimated 3,300 new stores in 90 new markets. The MDA hopes to help more new food companies attend their first tradeshows with its 2014 funding. "Zoie Glass of Lucille's Kitchen and co-owner of Midwest Pantry said, "We saw the largest impact from the TSP during our holiday season with a 31% increase in wholesale sales over the previous year. This program really allowed us to push our sales and we were thrilled with the results." Brief Description: Please join us for our two-part trail tour presented by Scott Kudelka, Minneopa Area Naturalist. The two programs, one in August and one in

September, will take place out on the Traverse des Sioux trails and will teach participants about the two very different landscapes on either side of the Minnesota River – the Prairie and the Big Woods. During the Prairie tour we will learn how prior to Euro-American settlement of southern Minnesota, the tall-grass prairie dominated the landscape through the Minnesota River basin. A hike through our restored prairie will give us a chance to learn about some of the plants and wildlife found in this ecosystem. Scott will talk about its benefits to the natural environment and how people over time have viewed and managed it as a resource. During the Big Woods program, we will examine how these forests formed in the first place, some of the rare species found in this ecosystem and its history over time. The dense forest dominated by maple and basswood once covered a 3,000 square mile area of southern Minnesota reaching all the way to present-day Mankato. Called "Bois Grand" or "Big Woods" by early French explorers, it was recognized as a distinct area from the band of hardwood forests. Both parts of the series are free and open to the public.
