# Minnesota River Lake Pepin Friendship Tour Chosen as Finalist in Statewide Contest - On-line Video Voting Nov. 30- Dec.10 will Determine Winner

A project designed to foster friendship between upstreamers from the Minnesota River and downstreamers from the Lake Pepin area has been chosen as one of 3 finalists in a statewide contest to promote collaboration across various sectors of Minnesota society. A video about the Minnesota River Lake Pepin Friendship tour project has been made and posted on-line at the InCommons Collaboration challenge website: <a href="http://www.incommons.org/CollaborationChallenge">http://www.incommons.org/CollaborationChallenge</a> The video that receives the most votes in the 10 days between Nov 30<sup>th</sup> and Dec 10th will receive a \$25,000 grant from the Bush Foundation to fund the continuation of the collaboration. Anyone with an e-mail address can vote and the names of everyone who votes will be entered into a drawing for a free flip video camera.

The Minnesota River Lake Pepin Friendship Tour Project is bringing together Minnesota River Farmers and city dwellers from the Twin Cities and Lake Pepin area and to foster understanding, common purpose and vision in the effort to address runoff from the Minnesota River that is settling out in Lake Pepin. The tour idea was conceived by Clean Up the River Environment (CURE) based in Montevideo MN. CURE enlisted the support of the Minnesota River Watershed Alliance, the Lake Pepin Legacy Alliance, the Minnesota Ag Water Resources Coalition, the Minnesota River Board and the Cannon River Watershed Partnership to help sponsor and organize the tours which were held in August and September 2010.

Plans call for a continuation of the Friendship Tour exchanges to establish common ground where farmers and consumers can collaborate. "We know that Minnesotans absolutely depend on clean water," stated CURE executive director Patrick Moore. "Minnesotans also want results and the only way we are going to get those results is if we really hear each other," Moore added. "That is what these Friendship Tours are all about."

The first-ever InCommons Collaboration Challenge recognizes and supports innovative collaborations to solve community problems. 223 collaborations from all over Minnesota entered the Challenge, all looking for the opportunity to receive \$25,000 to continue, replicate or expand their efforts. A group of evaluators, led by the Citizens League, and then an independent panel of expert judges have narrowed this group down to three outstanding collaborations:

Come see the film that Karen Himle, vice-president of PR at the University of Minnesota, didn't want you, or anyone, to see! *Troubled Waters* is an engaging, science-based, even-handed film that features interviews with innovative farmers and scientists who are involved with trying to fix the problems created by excessive agricultural run-off in the Mississippi River basin.

This film ignited a controversy at the University of Minnesota when University officials tried to censor the film because of their concerns that Big Ag would be offended. People responded strongly and swiftly, forcing the university to reverse its decision. However, the U has yet to deal with the issue at the heart of the controversy: conflict of interest and the influence of corporate agribusiness at our land grant

university. #### **Troubled Waters Documentary Showing in St Peter**

Come out to the Treaty Site History Center in St. Peter on December 7<sup>th</sup> (Tuesday) at 7 p.m. to see the documentary "Troubled Waters: A Mississippi River Story" and interact with some of the people interviewed in the film.

Troubled Waters explores the unintended consequences of commercial agriculture and urban runoff on the health of Lake Pepin, the Mississippi River and the "Dead Zone" in the Gulf of Mexico. This film documentary tells the story of how agricultural and urban runoff has dramatically impacted the health of these valuable natural resources. You will also learn about what farmers and citizens are doing to improve water quality in both the Minnesota and Mississippi rivers.

Carrie Jennings of the Minnesota Geological Survey and Mike Davis of the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources were interviewed in the documentary and will be on hand to offer their insights on water quality issues revolving around the Mississippi River and the film itself.

Carrie Jennings is a Glacial Geologist with the Minnesota Geological Survey. Jennings is one of the top experts on glacial geology and great at giving easy to understand answers to all your questions. Recently she has applied her knowledge of the distribution of glacial sediment in Minnesota (as well as the history of landscape and river evolution) to better define sources of sediment to the modern river systems of Minnesota, most notably, the Minnesota River and its tributaries.

Mike Davis has worked for the MN DNR since 1987 and specializes in freshwater mussel ecology, in particular on the Mississippi River. As part of the mussel conservation effort, Mike has played a major role in the plan to revive the endangered Higgins Eye mussel. Davis has conducted numerous mussel surveys across the Minnesota River Basin including setting up a long-term monitoring station on the Chippewa River.

This event is co-sponsored by the Nicollet County Historical Society, the Water Resources Center at Minnesota State University Mankato and the Minnesota River Board. Created in 1987, the Water Resources Center at Minnesota State University Mankato serves as a regional center for environmental research and information exchange. Our program is strengthen by the diversity of partnerships with nonprofit organizations, government agencies, schools and individual citizens all working on behalf of the MN River Basin.

The mission of the Minnesota River Board is to provide leadership, build partnerships, and support efforts to improve and protect water quality in the Minnesota River Basin. As a joint powers board, it is made up of one county commissioner from each of the counties in the watershed.

The Treaty Site History Center, headquarters of the Nicollet County Historical Society, is located a mile north of downtown St. Peter at Hwy 169 and 22, across from the Mankato Clinic. The screening is free and open to the public. Attendees are encouraged to make a \$5 contribution to help cover the costs of the event and support the organizations making the screening possible. Nature Conservancy buys 358-acre island in Duluth estuary (Star Tribune) A quiet, 10-year effort to protect Clough Island in the St. Louis River estuary of Lake Superior paid off for baby sturgeon Wednesday when the Nature Conservancy announced it has bought the island from private developer for \$1.5 million.
