Minnesota River Watershed Alliance Meeting – 2010 "Clean Up the Minnesota River" Focus

Last night over thirty people came out for the guarterly meeting of the Minnesota River Watershed Alliance to chose a "Clean Up the Minnesota River" focus for the group to concentrate on in 2010. After a spirited and fun debate, the group picked a combination of initiatives: to officially launch the Minnesota River Paddler Program with a June paddle on the Blue Earth River, host a Minnesota River Basin Conservation Practices bus tour for Lake Pepin citizens, support the effort to produce a Minnesota River Documentary and advocate to have the Governor's Fishing Opener held on the Minnesota River in the future. Minnesota Water Sustainability Framework Public Meetings

Minnesotans will have the chance to voice their opinion in person on how the state should invest resources to protect clean water at statewide public meetings beginning January 19, 2010.

The meetings are part of the Minnesota Water Sustainability Framework, a project spearheaded by the Water Resources Center which was charged by the 2009 Minnesota State Legislature to develop a set of recommendations to protect and preserve Minnesota's lakes, streams, rivers and ground waters for the 21st century. The project's final report, due to the 2011 legislature, will integrate citizens' values and concerns and serve as a roadmap, with timelines and benchmarks for the investment of an estimated \$86 million a year earmarked for the protection of water as a result of Minnesota's Clean Water, Land and Legacy Act.

The public meetings, called "listening sessions" will be facilitated by staff from the Water Resources Center and the Minnesota Board of Water and Soil Resources and are a chance for people to voice their opinions on a range of water-related issues from boating and water recreation, to priorities for cleaning up polluted lakes and streams.

From 12:30-3:30 p.m. each meeting will focus on the concerns of professionals associated with local units of government, state and federal agencies and other water resource organizations. Citizens, community leaders and elected and appointed officials will have a chance to share their concerns from 4 to 6 p.m.

After the initial period of surveys and public meetings, citizens will also have the ability to comment on drafts of the Framework as they are produced.

Water Quality Articles:

<u>Educator describes passive house</u> (New Ulm Journal). On Tuesday at the New Ulm Public library, a nature and environmental educator at Concordia Language Village in Bemidji described in detail how the super-insulated, energy efficient Waldsee BioHaus was built there.

<u>Studying animal, bird and fish fatalities can offer early warnings for all of us</u> (MinnPost). One of the places I keep tabs on as a journalist working on environmental issues also counts things – animal, bird and fish fatalities – and can be an important source of information in an avian flu-worried world.

<u>Minneapolis might buy riverfront industrial site to convert to park</u> (Finance and Commerce). In an example of how opportunity is sometimes born of misfortune, the swoon in the Twin Cities construction industry may soon lead to a major expansion of the Minneapolis parks system.

Rain water won't go to waste at the new Twins stadium (Minnesota Public Radio). Pentair Inc. is building and donating a sophisticated system to collect, filter, and re-use rain water at the new Twins stadium.

<u>Group's sewage claims fail smell test</u> (Minneapolis Star Tribune). A conservation group claimed that 500 septic pipes were dumping sewage into the Sunrise River. No way, say Chisago County officials.

<u>Bill aims to tighten rules on utility rate hikes</u> (Minneapolis Star Tribune). Minnesota's Attorney General and some lawmakers seek more accountability from utilities.

<u>Ethanol production hurting some grassland bird populations, study finds</u> (St. Paul Pioneer Press). Government incentives for corn-based ethanol have prompted farmers to convert land for corn production, hurting some grassland bird populations in the prairie pothole region of the Upper Midwest, a University of Michigan study says.

<u>North Dakota vs. Minn.: Dust-up over carbon</u> (Minneapolis Star Tribune). North Dakota is none too pleased with Minnesota as a deadline nears for what North Dakota claims will be a tax on coal-fired electricity.

<u>First-ever trends report tells a mixed story of Minnesota River Basin</u> (Jordan Independent). The Minnesota River Basin is a complex system, but the first-ever trends report provides a snapshot of what's happening in the watershed. It tells a mixed story with research showing some indicators of the river's health improving, some declining, and some static.

<u>Target Field sets 'environmental standard in sports'</u> (Minneapolis Star Tribune). The Twins' new playing field will be kept lush and green with lots of recycled rainwater.

<u>State says atrazine rules are adequate</u> (Minnesota Public Radio). The Minnesota Agriculture Department says state regulations controlling the use of a popular agricultural weedkiller are doing their job.

<u>L-SOHC pitches projects as debate rages</u> (Minnesota Outdoor News). The Lessard-Sams Outdoor Heritage Council last week recommended to the Legislature about \$56.2 million in projects for the second round of funding from the constitutional amendment voters approved in 2008.

<u>Holsten announces new strategy to improve duck hunting in state</u> (Minnesota Outdoor News). At the end of the DNR Roundtable last weekend, Commissioner Mark Holsten gathered outdoor writers attending to make an announcement.

Committee's bill would realign Minn. environmental departments (Minnesota Public Radio).

<u>Green jobs grow slowly</u> (Minneapolis Star Tribune). Federal funding for energy-saving projects has been slowed by a bureaucratic thicket.

<u>Deal reached for Lake Vermilion park</u> (Minneapolis Star Tribune). Minnesota has struck a deal with U.S. Steel to buy 3,000 acres for \$18 million that will become Lake Vermilion State Park.

<u>Researchers offer a new idea for ditches</u> (Associated Press). When was the last time you saw a ditch look any different than, well, a ditch?

<u>Editorial: Good work — the river is healthier</u> (Mankato Free Press). In many ways, the ongoing restoration of the Minnesota River Basin is a story of success. The water is less polluted, animals and aquatic organisms are seeing an encouraging rebound and appreciation for the value of the river continues to grow.

Signs of life in Minnesota River (Mankato Free Press). The Minnesota River contains less phosphorus, a whole lot more fish, less sediment and is seeing a rebound in the otter population.
